CONSERVATION CORNER...

The celebration of Coastweek (Sept. 20-Oct. 13) was initiated to help increase public awareness and understanding of one of our most vital and dynamic resources our nation's coast. Throughout the years, a great deal of stress has been placed on our coast - development, recreational use, and, of course - the shipbuilding and commercial fishing which flourished in the 18th and 19th centuries. A main problem here lies in the fact that our little known barrier beaches have suffered the beating as well.

What is a "barrier beach"? A narrow strip of beach and dunes separated from the mainland by a marsh, bay or river - which provides a storm buffer for our harbors and mainland areas behind it - such as Plum Island in Newbury and Ipswich, or Monomoy Island south of the Chatham mainland.

Why have our barrier beaches been harmed? Storms! Storms caused man's attempts to stabilize and control the resulting erosions as well as to repair the damaged homes and businesses. So it is man's response, ie. the building of seawalls that do the most harm since such endeavors interfere with the natural processes of the barrier beach, which, in time, is quite able to heal itself.

What can we do about that? Help make others aware that such environmental issues are not going to go away - that we citizens must take an interest in our local government and its role in barrier beach management. For instance, supporting the development of management plans for town-owned barrier beach areas to prevent improper development.

In the meantime, please support our Chapter's activities during Coastweek's celebration.
