B = 5-8 miles; C = under 5 miles.

Second character indicates leader's pace

Second character indicates leader's pace (average terrain):1 = very fast pace (2.5 or faster); 2 = fast (2-2.5 mph); 3 = moderate (1.5-2 mph); 4 = leisurely pace (less than 1.5 mph)

Third character indicates terrain:

A = very strenuous B = strenuous
C = average D = easy
Two letters at the end indicate a terrain between the two prime values. Hikers unsure of their capacity should try only one level higher than they previously attempted.

Remember that proposed bike trail that would link the Cape Cod Rail Trail at Eastham and the Province Lands bike trail in Provincetown...the one many of you wrote Herbert Olsen, Cape Cod National Seashore Superintendent, about earlier? Well, since then, the most controversial issue to come along in ages is just that, what with the variety of viewpoints voiced by bikers, Cape Cod, Seashore National Park and residents!

Safety: being able to ride along freely without the whiz of constant traffic to and from Provincetown is a strong issue in favor of the proposed bike trail say the cyclists. On the other hand, argue Truro residents, connecting Provincetown to Wellfleet means added publicity which would draw more cyclists...etc.

So, at present the Cape Cod National Seashore Advisory Commission, now back in business after a 16-month pause, is studying the situation and is expected to voice a recommendation sometime in September!

In the meantime, thanks to all of you who wrote to state "reps" in favor of the capital outlay bill, I can share the good news that the bill was passed by the House before the legislature adjourned for the summer! And now that that goal was achieved, we need next to, write our Senators NOW urging their support in mid-September when state legislature adjourns once again! If our Senators get a lot of letters for open space, chances are very good that the bill will become a priority for action! S.O.S...1860 the environmental bond bill! It is one of extreme value to all of us as it represents monies to be had for restorations, acquisitions, recreation funds and more...from Callahan Park in Framingham to renovation of Nickerson Park ...back to Nantasket.. over to Boston Harbor Island Parks..and more!

See you in the Senate....as well as out of Chapter trips in support of SEACOAST WEEK!
