

There's even more to the story... Bruce Dunham designed the logo and typeset for the first masthead in 1982. Bruce says: "When I started to do the artwork for the masthead, I had been told that the name for the newsletter would be "The Breeze." I made the decision to include the name of the chapter. There was some confusion at the time about the name of the chapter. I was new to the chapter and I kept hearing people say that the name of the chapter was Southeast and some were saying Southeastern. The name of the AMC magazine was the "Bulletin" and they printed the name of the Chapter as Southeast – but the SEM members at the first chapter meeting had voted for Southeastern. Being new to the Chapter I assumed that the AMC magazine had the right name. Had the correct name of the chapter been used, the first masthead would have been "Southeastern Breeze" in 1982 (nothing to do with wind direction)."



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



#### AMC VOLUNTEER TRAIL AND SHELTER PROJECTS

The Appalachian Mountain Club maintains over 1,000 miles of trail (including 350 miles of the Appalachian Trail), numerous backcountry shelters and miles of ski touring trails in the Northeast. Volunteers do much of the work and more volunteers (individuals, families and groups) are wanted. Opportunities exist through our Chapters and Camps who, through individual assignments and regularly scheduled weekend outings, do much trail and shelter work from the Delaware Valley area on up into Maine. A new summer volunteer crew, operating on weekly room and board basis, to do various trail projects with a leader on the Mt. Greylock Reservation in western Massachusetts, will be based at Bascom Lodge. In the White Mountains of New Hampshire, four summer programs exist. The Volunteer Crew allows individuals and groups to work one or more weeks on a room and board basis. Approximately 25-30 volunteers work each week doing day and overnight trips to do a variety of work with a skilled leader. Weekend projects are also scheduled which allow people to sign up for a specific one- or two-day task (e.g., cairning, bridge building, etc.) also with a leader. Room and board provided. The Adopt-A-Trail and Adopt-A-Shelter programs let volunteers take on a particular trail or shelter and do the work on their own time at their own pace. Training, tools, and some accommodations available. Lastly, two special trail projects have been arranged in the scenic West, one in the beautiful Teton National Park (July 24-August 5) and the other in the Wind River Range of the Bridger Teton National Forest (August 14-26) both in Wyoming, Food, tools, some equipment and experienced leaders provided.



#### AN UPDATE ON ACID RAIN

Do you remember that the AMC..and our very own SEM Chapter..are assisting with the ACID RAIN Monitoring (ARM) program..and are among some 800 volunteers collecting water samples from various lakes and streams???? Done on the third Sunday of each month, the water samples are given to regional coordinators who take them to labs for analysis: pH levels, alkalinity..and other parameters which give a "handle" on whether or not our lakes, ponds, and streams---and the LIFE in them---are REALLY in danger!

Data compiled from the FIRST THREE samplings indicate that the water bodies of Southeastern MASS. are in serious danger: of becoming acidified to the point of no longer supporting life! The pH values range from 5.5-6.3 generally--low, but not critical--



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

#### A FAREWELL ..

It is with deep sadness that I, the editor of this Newsletter, bid adieu to a fellow AMC'er, and, without a doubt, a most loyal one, December, 31, 1983.

His name? Col. John J. Dalton. Most of you knew him...perhaps not personally but at least through the "Breeze" as Hike Co-ordinator for most of, if not all, hikes on Cape Cod.

The "colenel," as he loved being called, passed away at Cape Cod Hospital after having fought hard to conquer the ailment that continued to weaken him throughout the past several months.

I have known him for seven years. He appeared one day on the Sandy Neck Hike Bud Carter was leading but then we did not see him again for about a year. "That's because I had a heart attack!" he explained when he reappeared on another hike. And from that time on, not only has he supported all of our hikes as a follower, but, rather, as a leader! "I believe we should have a hike every Sunday!" he insisted and pursued that belief by volunteering to lead the weekly outings himself!

"Thank heavens you latched on to Jack!" his wife once confided before she passed away (in 1982). "Without you (AMC), he's like a caged up tiger pacing around this house!" She went on to explain that he devoted hours to plotting Cape Cod hikes on his maps, scouting them out and keeping himself in shape' for them by daily 2-4 mile walks in his neighborhood.

A man of wisdom, the "colonel" touched on all our lives in some way. For "his" hikers he encouraged faithful participation in his Sunday walks and on his Thursday morning ones too. We knew he was a good man because of his dedication to the hiking program...that he was a fine leader because he so carefully planned out each of those hikes he scheduled, such as the Thoreau Walks, and that as an Army commander who, in battle, refused to be evacuated until all his men were, he did care for his "troops"...those of us supporting his Hiking Program.





The long-awaited proposed plan for the White Mtn. Nat'l. Forest and Environmental Impact Statement is out. It defines activities over the next ten years for the 750,000-acre tract in New Hampshire and Maine. Proposed actions include:

 Maintain current levels of non-motorized back country usage

- Reconstruct and relocate hiking trails to minimize resource damage; provide more trails for short family hikes.
- Expand alpine ski areas--major at Loon Mountain, some at Waterville and Attitash.
- Increase number of campsites by 182 units, with increased access for handicapped, group camping and some walk-in areas.
- 5) Recommend congressional wilderness study of 12,000 acres of caribou-speckled area in Maine.
- Recommend Kilkenny unit (north of forest) continue as multiple use area--major non-motorized pedestrian, some snowmobile and timber harvesting.
- Construct 14 miles of timber access road each year
- 8) Establish Mt. Chocorua Scenic Area
- Maintain close-to-current levels of timber harvest (38 million board-feet)

# Winter Memories... by John French

My first ski equipment consisted of skis, with simple toestraps for bindings, plus a <u>single</u> five-foot pole with a leather loop at one end and a wooden disk and spike at the other. I sometimes even made it to the bottom of the hill still standing up! I later got better skis with "harness" bindings, and discovered the advantages of two lighter weight poles. In the 1920s and 30s, I skied with the White Mountain Ski Runners (White Mules) and learned the basic turns and the telemark.

Transportation to the slopes was varied-snow trains from North Station, then farmer's trucks, sometimes open trolley cars up the mountains. Then, of course, it was all "footpower." Finally in 1933, word spread of a new gadget in Woodstock, VT . . . an endless rope, driven by a gas engine, that would pull you uphill-otherwise known as a rope tow! Gunstock Mountain had another version, requiring a handle with claws, to hold onto the rope.

One feature of those days is still with us ... spring skiing at Tuckerman's Ravine. Lacking the helicopters of today, we carried our skis to the top, stripped down, and acquired a suntan on the way down.

In my long skiing career, I've seen lots of changes in services and equipment for skiers, but the best memories are of the people I met. People like Carroll Reed, soldier, insurance agent, and eventually retailer; like the Whitneys, who started Black Mountain Inn and ski area; like the White Mules gang and the AMC "Apes" of the early days.

On many weekends, it may be in the White Mountains where tens of thousands of people come to get away from it all and where developers in the past four years have erected so many outlet shopping centers on a two-lane alley through the valley that traveling a mile can take an hour . . ." according to a front page article in the Feb. 24, 1985 Boston Globe! It went on to say that the White Mt. Nat'l. Forest is the second most used national forest for recreation in the nation "and the Conway thoroughfare is New Hampshire's busiest on any weekend."

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## CANOEING...

Chuck Wright (564-4250) Barbara Hughes (362-3954)

The canoe program is intended to suit the interests and abilities of persons from rank beginners to whitewater experts. Beginners are introduced to canoeing at special instruction days, and there are also many suitable day trips. If you'd like to try canoeing, call one of us for advice. You don't have to have a boat to join us as we have a boat to rent and boat owners frequently need partners. We do our best to see that everyone who wants to, gets on the water.

Day trips usually begin about 10 AM, stop for lunch, and end about 3 PM. For flatwater trips, wind is the prime consideration in determing relative difficulty. Most trips will be easy if the wind is light. Tidal trips are more apt to run into strong wind requiring strong--or at least efficient-paddling ability.

Weekend trips require only marginally more ability than day trips. They offer the opportunity to explore water farther from home, include camping, and often an evening paddle. They provide an opportunity to become more "immersed" (argh!) in the experience. Non-whitewater canoeing is done primarily to get outdoors, explore new or familiar waters, exercise, birdwatch, etc. Skill is secondary.

In whitewater canoeing, there is more emphasis on the development of skills. Whitewater rivers are rated according to their difficulty and paddlers earn ratings as they master these levels of difficulty. It is but a small step from flatwater skills to Class I river skills but a long way to Class IV or V skills.

Mastering these skills is undertaken for the challenge and the thrill. These skills also open up the opportunity to undertake wilderness trips. For some, these are the ultimate goal--trips down the wild rivers of Labrador or Alaska, etc.--trips to be remembered for a lifetime.

Another growing activity is sea kayaking, which combines the enjoyment of flatwater paddling with the capacity to travel farther, faster, and in more varied conditions. You also develop seamanship skills--navigation, assessment of weather and sea conditions, rescue skills, etc.

The bike program offers something for everyone. Call the leader if you've got any questions. Don't put it off - pick a trip and call now - they fill fast! To help you choose a trip suited to your biking abilities and interests, here's a guideline to our trip rating system.

Beginner: up to 15 miles, 2 or more hours. Geared to riders with very little cycling experience. Frequent stops.

15-25 miles. Easy: Slow to moderate pace, with a few hills.

25-30 miles. Moderate pace, Interm.: occasional hills.

Advanced: More than 50 miles, fast pace and/or very hilly.

General Info about bike trips:

- Please preregister for all trips with leader or co-leader.
- 10 speeds desirable, but many trips OK for 3-speed. Check with leader.
- Helmets' suggested, but not mandatory unless specified by leader.
- Children are welcome when accompanied by adult, but must be OK'd by leader.





"I want people to go out and enjoy the land and the rest of it will take care of itself," believes William McKay, a member of the Friends of the Mashpee River of Cape Cod. He and many others know the only real way to appreciate the beauty of the outdoors such as that along the 8-mile course of the Mashpee River is to canoe it, or to walk its shores!

McKay and fellow members of the Friends of the Mashpee River are attempting to save the river by convincing the town they ought to take advantage of the chance to buy 250 undeveloped acres along the east banks of the river. "Save the Mashpee River" bumper stickers, showing colored slides of the river set to instrumental music and giving guided tours of the area are methods his organization is using.

Perhaps some of US could make it a point to use the Mashpee River - by foot or by canoe - and to do the same . . . often! . . . in our OWN immediate areas - be it on Cape Cod or in the suburbs of Boston, the Charles River, Blue Hills, Arnold Arboretum, and elsewhere, if only to encourage others to do the same: "to go out and enjoy the land, and the rest will take care of itself."

**CONSERVATION CORNER...**

Well, folks, it's time to fight! Bear with me and I'll tell you why...but first, a question. DID YOU KNOW there is such a thing as the NATIONAL TRAILS SYSTEM ACT? And that Congress in 1978 allocated \$90 million for land acquisitions to provide permanent protection for our beloved Appalachian Trail?

Well, 'tis true. BUT, one little flaw is that the actual amount to be spent each year must be approved by the Congress.

So, here's the problem...for fiscal year 1986, the President has allowed for ZERO \$ for AT land buys, and has asked for a 3-yr. moratorium on all Federal land acquisitions. But AT Committee officials have protested by requesting \$9.3 million for the Natl. Park Service and \$700,000 for the Forest Service, so Congress has been busy with eharings since May. That's where we come in!

AMC-ers owe it to ourselves to voice our opinions on the matter to our legislators NOW! If the AT acquistion project is not funded, there's a chance that we'll be left with disjointed sections of the Trail.

#### **CONSERVATION CORNER...**

"The Boston Chapter Task Force on Clean Air and Acid Rain is endorsing Mass. Senate bill 1187, an act to limit acid rain and acid deposition caused by in-state pollution. The bill calls first for a <u>cap</u> on sulfur dioxide emissions (SO<sub>2</sub> converts to sulfuric acid in the atmosphere) and, starting in 1989, a gradual reduction in emissions to a level considered (relatively) environmentally healthful. At present, S. 1187 is stalled in the Senate Ways and Means Committee.

"We ask that any or all concerned persons write to Senate President William Bulger (State House, Boston 02133) and urge him to move the bill forward. It will help to send <u>copies</u> of any letters to both your State Senator and Representative, <u>and</u> to Governor Dukakis, at the same address.

"Much support for this bill has been mobilized by MASSPIRG, the Mass. Public Interest Research Group. On a separate front, MASSPIRG is planning a major initiative petition drive which is designed to put a proposed acid rain/acid deposition rogram on the State ballot. Volunteers are urgently needed for the petition signature campaign (late September), and we encourage all AMC members to sign the petition when it arrives at your door."

#### CONSERVATION CORNER...

From the Executive Office of Environmental Affairs in Boston comes the good news that there IS ongoing hope that "powers-that-be" really do care about our environment. According to Environmental Affairs Secretary James S. Hoyte, the State's Self Help Land Acquisition program (which provides up to 80% reimbursement to communities for the acquisition of conservation land) comes to 7.5 million dollars to be awarded statewide with the major percent going to Cape Cod: Brewster, Chatham, Falmouth, Mashpee, Wellfleet and Yarmouth.

But off-Cape areas such as the Town of Middleboro received grants, too...the latter to acquire Pratt Farm in order to protect 160 acres of land from development.

"The State's Self Help Land Acquisition Program is an excellent example of one significant way to protect sensitive lands in partnership with the local cities and towns," said Secretary Hoyte.

Another significant method, so far as each of us within the community of Southeastern Mass AMC is concerned, to help protect our wildlife areas, riverfronts, ground waters, etc., is by attending town meetings...and keeping the Conservation Chair and Committee informed to those conservation concerns we might be able to do something about. #### 1986 HIKING SCHEDULE

SO, YOU WANT TO TRY SOME HIKING! by Walter Morin

You are thinking of wanting to do some hiking but perhaps running through your mind is - I don't know if I can do it -I bet all those people on hikes are pros - What do I need - What is an intermediate or beginner hike? These thoughts and many similar ones are not uncommon to all who started hiking. They were mine as well, but the important decision to make is to try it. Beginner hikes are just that. You will note, through the months of April to July, the hiking committee will offer a Beginner series consisting of seven trips. They begin with hikes of seven to thirtzen miles in the Blue Hills. They are at a pace of about two miles per hour with the leader explaining how to cope with the different terrains and conditions. Equipment for these hikes is just a good pair of sneakers and perhaps a day pack to carry some lunch and drink. The emphasis is on encouragement to the beginner, giving the person the chance to see if he or she likes it or not.

The third and fourth hikes in the Beginner series are day hikes in the White Mountains, not too hard, but a chance to see how one does, going up and down some steep terrains. For these trips hikers will need better hiking shoes and basic gear and clothes. That will be explained before each trip to each prospective hiker when he or she calls the leader to register and to inquire about the trip.

The fifth and sixth in the series takes the beginner to the White Mountains and the Long Trail in Vermont for some weekend backpacking. The beginners will be instructed how to carry backpacks, how to set up tents, help in community cooking, how to identify trails, and in general the do's and don'ts of hiking.

The last in the Beginner series is an enjovable Hut experience. The hiker will backpack into the Hut but will not have to do much cooking as the Hut crew will feed and entertain you.

The most important ingredient in all hikes, one that occurs naturally, is the enjoyment one gets meeting, talking and sharing ideas with others. Give yourself this opportunity while at the same time observing some great views and challenges right here in New England. **CONSERVATION CORNER...** 

By Pam Carter

"Cooperation is common in the animal world, and it is often the key to survival in hostile environments," reports Bernd Heinrich in "Ravens On My Mind," in the March, 1986 issue of "Audubon" magazine. This Maine naturalist observed that coyotes and ravens had simultaneously moved into an area which had earlier been frequented only by deer and moose.."the common link for survival of raven and coyote in winter."

He later noted that at times the calls of the ravens were not just the usual "quork, quork," but sounded more like high-pitched yells. "Do ravens, possibly the most intelligent of all birds, cooperate with each other in finding food?" After spending days observing their behavior, he concluded that indeed the ravens communicated with one another. Their yells seemed to notify others that food had been found and that never did a single raven dine alone..but rather, in groups.

Perhaps we human beings should pay more attention to the "goings-on" within the animal world, particularly whenever it pertains to our environment. Caring and sharing the responsibilities about ground water and protection of our seacoast should become a vital part of our every being.

How nice it would be for each of us to feel the way Mr. Heinrich did: "I feel warmed inside by the knowledge that the ravens' sharing behavior is indeed real and it is even more important than I had originally supposed." We can try - by sharing, communicating and caring!

### **CONSERVATION CORNER...**

by Pam Carter

The protection of ground water, and that 'n our coastal areas as well, is the priorty concern of your Conservation Committee. GROUND WATER - that fresh water found beneath the ground, which is pumped from wells for human consumption. SOLE SOURCE ACQUIFIER - a peninsula like Cape Cod whose only source of drinking water is ground water. LEACHATE - Rain water that has become polluted by passing through solid or toxic waste as it percolates to ground water. According to studies, because of ground water's mobility, pollution in one area of an acquifier can potentially pollute another area. Pollution sources are numerous and many are caused by growing numbers of developments which take over the amount of ground surface on which rain can fall before soaking "nicely" into the ground. The goal of this message is to make you AWARE!

## CONSERVATION CORNER...

by Pam Carter

The celebration of Coastweek (Sept. 20-Oct. 13) was initiated to help increase public awareness and understanding of one of our most vital and dynamic resources our nation's coast. Throughout the years, a great deal of stress has been placed on our coast - development, recreational use, and, of course - the shipbuilding and commercial fishing which flourished in the 18th and 19th centuries. A main problem here lies in the fact that our little known barrier beaches have suffered the beating as well.

What is a "barrier beach"? A narrow strip of beach and dunes separated from the mainland by a marsh, bay or river - which provides a storm buffer for our harbors and mainland areas behind it - such as Plum Island in Newbury and Ipswich, or Monomoy Island, south of the Chatham mainland.

Why have our barrier beaches been harmed? Storms! Storms caused man's attempts to stabilize and control the resulting erosions as well as to repair the damaged homes and businesses. So it is man's response, ie. the building of seawalls that do the most harm since such endeavors interfere with the natural processes of the barrier beach, which, in time, is quite able to heal itself.

What can we do about that? Help make others aware that such environmental issues are not going to go away - that we citizens must take an interest in our local government and its role in barrier beach management. For instance, supporting the development of management plans for town-owned barrier beach areas to prevent improper development.

In the meantime, please support our Chapter's activities during Coastweek's celebration.

## CONSERVATION CORNER...

By Pam Carter

In keeping with the spirit of COASTWEEK '86 (Sept. 20=Oct. 12), you might be interested to know that the tide is rising!

According to the Coastal Zone Management, the world's oceans are about 400 feet higher than they were during the Ice Age when massive glaciers covered most of northern North America. A warming trend that followed was responsible for that, of course, but for the past 5000 years that warming slowed down - or else today's tides might be even higher. However, now because of increased global temperatures' plus a change in our atmosphere called "the greenhouse effect", scientists predict our sea level could rise as much as 6-8 feet in the next 100 years.

Tide rise is relative to land level. For instance, in Massachusetts the relative rate of sea level rise today is slightly less than one foot per century.

Problems associated with sea level rise include beach erosion, frequent flooding of low-lying areas, and contamination of groundwater by saltwater intrusion.

The good news is that the awareness of potential trouble is in the hands of "powers-that-be" such as CZM in Massachusetts which is funding a sea level rise study at the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institute. This study, to be completed Nov. 1, 1986, will determine how much of our coastline could be submerged over the next 40 years.

The moral of this message is to enjoy our seacoast and to take the best care of it we can NOW...tide-rise or not!

### SOUTHEASTERN MASSACHUSETTS CHAPTER

of the

APPALACHIAN NOUNTAIN CLUB

First Writing 18 March 1976 Revision 19 January 1978 Revision November 1986

### Article 1.

This organization shall be called the Southeastern Massachusetts Chapter of the Appalachian Mountain Blub. The tern Club used herein is to be construed to mean the Corporation, the Appalachian Mountain Club.

### Article II.

The purposes of the Chapter are to cooperate with and to further the objectives of the AppaPachian Mountain Club in general, and in particular, as they encompass Southeastern Massachusetts and adjacent regions.

### Article III.

Any member of the Appalachian Mountain Club residing in the following counties: Bristol, Dukes, Nantucket, and Plymouth shall be a member of the Chapter unless he notifies the Recording Secretary of the Club in writing to the contrary. Club members residing elsewhere shall be enrolled as members of this Chapter upon receipt by the Recording Secretary of the Club of a written request to that effect by such a member.

## Article IV.

 The following officers and Standing Committee Chairpersons shall be elected at each Annual Meeting;

Chairperson Vice-Chairperson Secretary Treasurer Bicycle Committee Chairperson Canoe Committee Chairperson Trails Committee Chairperson Trails Committee Chairperson Hiking & Excursion Committee Chairperson Membership Committee Chairperson Communications Committee Chairperson Education Committee Chairperson

# 2. The duties of the officers are generally described as follows:

A. <u>Chairperson</u> - the Chapter Chairperson shall be the executive and administrative officer of the Chapter and of the Executive Board, and shall be the representative of the Chapter to the Appalachian Mountain Club. The Chapter Chairperson shall serve no more than two full consecutive terms. Four months before the Annual Meeting, the Chapter Chairperson shall appoint a Nominating Committee of five (5) members. Two months before the Annual meeting, the Chapter Chairperson shall appoint two auditors to audit the Chapter books and the Committee books.

B. <u>Vice-Chairperson</u> - the Vice-Chairperson shall serve as the Chairperson in the absence or disability of the Chapter Chairperson, and shall assume other responsibilities as may be delegated to him by the Chapter Chairperson and/or Executive Board.

C. <u>Secretary</u> - the Secretary shall give notice of all Executive Board and Chapter meetings, shall keep the minutes of all the meetings and the records of the Chapter, and shall conduct all correspondence of the Chapter: The Secretary shall file with Club headquarters copies of all Chapter publications.

D. Treasurer - the Treasurer shall receive all funds paid to or belonging to the Chapter, and shall disburse the same under the direction of the Executive Board. The Treasurer shall keep proper accounts and make a report of receicts and disbursements at each meeting of the Executive Board, and submit a final audited report, as of the preceding June 30th at the Annual, Meeting. In addition, the Treasurer shall region all Committee budgets : and all Committee funds. No. excenditures shall be made and no Tinancial obligation shall be incurred, for which the Club May be responsible, by any officer or Committee of the Chapter without previous authorization by the Council of the Club.

3. Standing Committees - with the exception of the Executive Board, the Chairperson of each Standing Committee with the approval of the Executive Board will appoint the members of his Committee with due tradand to geographic distribution. Each Consister shall be responsible for sending trip notices to the designated member of the Communications Committee Leditors of the Bulletin or Timesl in time to: appear in advance of the dates set; The Chairperson of each Standing Committee shall serve no more than three (3) consecutive terms. Each Standing Conmittee is responsible to, the Executive Board, Twhich in turn is responsible to, and reports to; the general membership of the Chapter and to the Club].

A. Executive Board - The Executive Board is the governing body of this Chapter and is composed of the Officers and the Standing Committee Chairpersons. The Executive Spard shall meet at least quarterly or at the call of the Chairperson or by five (5) members of the Executive Board. The Executive Board may fill any vacancy which becurs in this Committee by a majority vote, a cuorum being present. Such appointment shall terminate at the date of the next Annual Meeting. The Regional Councillor is an ex-officio member of the Board. The Executive

Board is responsible to, and reports to the general membership of the Chapter, and to the Club.

B. Bicycle Committee - [the Bicycle Committee shall premote the establishment of new bicycle paths and associated facilities in this area; and shall chart or recommend the more acceptable. routes. It will offer opportunities and trips to be sponsored by the Chapter. 1 The Bicycle Committee shall provide a schedule of bicycle trips and educational events. It shall also promote safe cycling practices and represent the Chapter to other organizations, the State, cities or towns with respect to the development of new bicycle paths and facilities in the Southeastern Mass. area-10

L. <u>Cance Coamittee</u> - The Banke Committee shall promote canceing and related activities in our area's water bodies, fin conjunction with the Conservation Committee, I shall arrange cance trips and other water sports to be sponsored by the Chapter, shall have charge of the Chapter's Iffeet of I boats (if any), and offer instruction in the art of canceing. <u>The Chairperson will</u> represent the Chapter to the Club Inter-Chapter Cance Committee.

D.' Conservation Committee - The Conservation Committee shall plan and carry out a program if information and education on timely matters in the field of Conservation and may work with other organizations with similar conservation objectives. It shall make position statements to the Executive Board, and when authorized to do so by the Executive Board, may bublicize the odsition of the Chapter. No statements will be made in the name of the Appalachian Mountain Club, without the approval of the Council. The Chairperson will represent the Chapter to the Club Board of Natural Resources.

E. <u>IExcursion Committee</u> - The Excursion Committee shall provide a grogram of general excursions and other activities not specifically covered by other Executive Board Committees. It will engender a sense of responsibility for the ecology of the traversed areas along Chapter members and foster an appreciation and respect of all areas in which members travel.1

Hiking and Excursions Committee - The Hiking and Excursions Committee shall provide a program of day and weekend hikes, backpacking trips, local walks and winter activities, and coordinate the development of additional activities not specificallycovered by other Chapter Committees. The Hiking and Excursions Committee Chairperson will coordinate the organization of these activities, and will enlist the aid of as many assistants or subcommittees as is useful to serve the interests of the Chapter. The Committee will provide educational programs promoting the safe and responsible use of the outdoors in regard to it's activities. The Chairperson will represent the Chapter to the Club Inter-Chapter Excursions Committee.

F. <u>Membership Committee</u> -[The Membership Committee shall keep an accurate record of all active members of the Southeastern Mass. Chapter and make an annual-report. It will furnish information concerning the Club to those who request it and will supply the other Committees with membership information as requested. The Chairperson is the representative of the Chapter to the Club Membership Committee.]

The Membership Committee shall develop programs to recruit new members and encourage participation in Chapter activities by all members.

Particular emphasis will be placed on welcoming and retaining new members. The Committee will maintain records of all paid members of the Southeastern Mass. Chapter, and make an annual report to the Executive Board on the status and growth of the membership. It will furnish membership roster information to other Chapter Committees. The Chairperson will represent the Chapter to the Club Board of Membership and coordinate membership services with the Headquarters Operations personnel. G. <u>Communications Committee</u> -[The Communications Committee shall be in charge of the publication of the Chapter newsletter, shall organize selected write-ups of Chapter activities and other material for publication, and perform such duties as assigned by the Executive Board.]

The Communications Committee will manage the publication and distribution of the Chapter newsletter, and coordinate the submission of notices to the Chapter's section of the Club publications. The Chairperson will enlist the aid of other Committee members and assistants as necessary to ensure the timely receipt of the Newsletter by Chapter members. In addition, the Chairperson is espowered, in consultation with the Chapter Chairperson, to contract for printing, mailing and other services as needed and funded. The Committee shall also assist in making available to the media information about the Chapter in general and such activities as the Committees wish to publicize.

H. <u>Irails Committee</u> - The Trails. Committee shall [supervise] <u>participate in</u> the research, land] development and <u>maintenance</u> of trails in the Southeastern Massachusetts area, <u>and serve as</u> liaison to local, state, regional and other trails organizations. <u>The Committee shall organize and promote Chapter participation in Club programs for trail maintenance. <u>The Chairperson will</u> represent the Chapter to the Club Trails Committee.</u>

1. Education Committee - The Education Committee will organize educational workshops for the Chapter membership and the general public in conjunction with the other Standing Committees. The Committee will maintain contact with the AMC Board of Education and make known to the members educational programs of interest. The Chairperson will enlist the aid of other Education Committee members, as well as individuals from the other Committees for assistance on specific projects. 4. <u>Ad-Hor Committees</u> - The Chapter Chairperson may appoint such other Committees, and their Chairperson' as may be necessary and proper for the working activities of the Chapter. All such Committees shall have such powers and duties as may be assigned to them by the Executive Board. The Chapter Chairperson shall have the prerogative to terminate such Committees.

5. Novinating Committee - A Nominating Committee of five members of the Chapter shall be appointed annually by the Chapter Chairperson with the advice and consent of the Executive Board not later than May Ist. No. member of the Executive Board may serve on this Committee. The names of the Nominating Committee, 50 appointed, together with a list of their nominees for the offices to be filled shall be made known to all members of the Chapter not later than [60] 45 days prior to the date of the Annual Meeting. Additional meminations may then be made in writing by any ten members, who shall specify their candidate and the office for which they neminate. Such momination shall be placed in the hands of the Chairperson of the Nominating Committee or the Chapter Secretary or be addressed to either bearing a postmark not later than 21 days prior to the date of the Annual Meeting. No person shall be eligible for office unless nominated in accordance with one of the forgoing provisions, except that in the case of death, incapacity or withdrawal of the nominee, nomination may be made from the floor. The notice of the Annual Meetino shall contain a complete list of elective offices and the names of all candidates for each office.

### Article V.

### Meetings -

1. The Annual Meeting of the Chapter, to hear the reports of the President, Treasurer, and other officers and Committees, and to elect officers , shall be held on such evening during the months of October of November at such hour and place as shall be designated by the Executive Spard. The Chapter Chairperson, Vice-

Chairperson, Treasurer, Secretary, and Standing Committee Chairpersons, after nomination as per Article IV, Section 5, shall be chosen by ballot, provided however, that should there be but one nominee for an office, election may be made by voice vote.

2. Special meetings may be called by the Chapter Chairperson or the Executive Board on 21 days written notice to the members stating the purpose of the call, and shall be called whenever 25 members in writing, stating the purpose, shall request the Executive Board to call a special meeting.

3. Twenty-five members shall constitute a quorum for a transaction of business at any Chapter meeting. Fifty-one percent of the members of the Executive Board or any other committees shall constitute a quorum. Meetings shall be conducted according to Robert's Rules of Order.

### Article VI.

### By-Laws Amendments

These by-laws may be amended by the Chapter members at the annual meeting or at a special meeting called for that purpose, by a two-thirds vote, a quorum being present; provided that notice of the proposed amendment shall have been sent to all members of the Chapter at least 21 days prior to the meeting.

### Article VII.

### Standing Rules

Standing rules may be made and amended by the Executive Board with a majority vote, a quorum being present. They become effective when posted in a pertinent location or distributed to the membership.

### Article WILL.

### Adoption

These By-Laws shall replace any previous By-Laws and may be adopted at an annual meeting of the Chapter or at a special meeting called for the purpose. They shall become effective when approved by the Council of the Club. They shall, when adopted and approved, be equally binding on the Chapter and the Club.

## **CONSERVATION CORNER...**

by Pam Carter

Focusing attention on "Coastweek 86" as well as two main areas of concern regard our local environment: water protection and wetlands preservation, has been the theme of this column for much of the past year-and-a-half. But...since many of us feel the need to "escape" to the mountain from time to time...let"s reacquaint ourselves with the White Mountain National Forest!

After all, the WMNF is now 75 years old thanks to the passage of the Weeks Act, the national legislation which helped to establish it - and is a very popular "youngster" in the eyes of those of us who seek out what the hiking guidebooks describe as "pristine wilderness" and "unbroken forest".

But, unfortunately, outdoor enthusiasts like ourselves are not the only ones interested in our 75 year old friend. There are others like tourism officials and the timber industry, who also have an interest in the present and future of WMNF. So, a main challenge to that "pristine wilderness" is multi-use. To help provide for that, the U.S. Forest Service devised a 10-year Management Plan (see Sept. APPALACHIA) directing how the forest best be used, a compromise, so to speak, among its users. However, that plan met with criticism from five environmental groups announcing they would appeal. AMC decided that, although it would support the plan, to file for intervenor status in order to continue to be actively involved in all future decisions having to do with WMNF - good news to this conservationist who believes it pays to care, to get involved and to "educate" others into doing so as well.

Even better news, the announcement headlined "White Mountain Reprieve" in the fall issue of Wilderness Magazine states that the USFS has granted a "stay. This means that nothing can be done to controversial portions of the WMNF (like timber sales of roadless tracts) while the stay is in effect, or until two other appeals of the White Mountain plan have been decided upon.

So...let's escape to the mountains...and keep in mind we need each other to help take care of our 75 year old friend, with hopes that others will take note and do the same!

And anyway, "Tourtelotte knew but two Voyageur's Songs and of those only the Choruses," said the inquest report, "and made of them such a Constant Clangour as to propagate Dread and effect a Shew of Force"

So what has New Jersey got to do with us in this corner of the world? Plenty! Our beaches are dirty, too! Many of the hikers, canoers, and walkers see beach litter constantly, and in fact, hauled out bagsful of trash during Coastweek last Autumn.

Now, aside from being unaesthetic, garbage is hazardous, not just to marine life but a potential hazard to US, as well.

What is a land bank bill? That's what I wanted to know so wrote a letter to State Representative, Hehri Rauschenbach and State Senator, Paul Doane. Both replied. One by letter. The other in person when he came to our home and spent a delightful hour's visit.

Definition: the fundamental concept of land banks is to tax real estate transfers to generate funds. To acquire open space and natural areas. Land bank revenues could provide much needed, additional resource to towns that would fund vital land conservation initiatives.

It is no secret that we humans have been guilty of causing threats to our natural resources (watar pollution, air pollution). The need for all of us is to occasionally touch base with a bit of wilderness is a basic one (the hiker in the mountains, cancelst in white-water, the whale watcher, the walker in the park), so we must all work towards preserving open space and natural recreation land.

One of the best ways is for each of us to write to bur legislators to urge them to support funding this year in favor of passage of statewide land bills. 

The good news is that about 250 "concerned citizens" gathered at the State House, in spite of the weather to show their support for Land Day '87 sponsored by the Massachusetts Audubon Society and the Environmental Lobby of Massachusetts Tuesday, April 28. This is encouraging news that about 90 groups are in favor of our current "land bank" bills and increased funding for land preservation programs.

Now the important thing is, do you understand what all this means? Simply: Land Bank Bills, if passed, give our towns the authority to adopt a local real estate transfer tax to fund land protection along with affordable housing.

State Rep. Henri Rauschenbach, emphasized this at our April Conservation meeting and said that since preservation of open space is one of the most important issues facing all of us within the Commonwealth, one thing we all could do would be write our legislators in support of Bill H4164, a bill recently filed by Governor Dukakis, a \$258 million capital outlay budget for open space acquisition.

Are you listening? Are you aware of the fact that the population in Barnstable County has increased 53% within the last dozen years, the largest percentage gain in New England? What is this doing to our land? What about within your community?

Anyway, please write your legislator at once. I've got the name and address if you don't know. In the meantime, please support our Chapter's June weekend at Camp Burgess and after breakfast Sunday, come to our "Conservation Corner" when Dave Hoskins. AMC Conservation Director, will show an excellent slide program of what the club has done, as a whole, in the care of our environment.

#### CONSERVATION CORNER 398-2605 Pam Carter

Good News! from State Rep., Henri Rauschen-bach that the efforts of conservation-minded citizens, organizations, and, of course, legislators like himself are really beginning to pay off for the Commonwealth.

In the House right now is a bill better known as the <u>Natural Resources</u> Capital Outlay Bill which is asking the grand sum of \$433 million for such marvelous things as Trails Acquisition, River Conservation and Parks like Nickerson State Park which SE AMC uses a lot for recreational activities.

This "corner" will keep you posted on its progress but in the meantime let's take a look at some of the threats facing other areas which AMC members use for recreational pursuits.

<u>Saddleback</u>: the National Park Service has asked AMC's input on developing a corridor to protect, permanently, the A.T. on Saddleback. See: Saddleback is proposing a major expansion of its ski area which obviously could impact the AT. This is a sticky issue which could get worse so our Conservation Director, David Hoskins is keeping a watchful eye in or-der to give an appropriate response.

<u>Greylock</u>: We are studying what en-vironmental impact the proposed Greylock Glen Resort in North Adams might do to the land adjacent to Greylock and the home of our beloved Bascom Lodge.

Quincy Quarries: Please read the update in your June Bulletin.

North Conway: To alleviate traffic con-gerstion, N.H. is proposing a Bypass around the town threatening national forest, etc. So, AMC's Charlie Burnham and David Hoskins are carefully monitoring the situation in order to formulate what position to take.

WHEW! All sorts of problems threatening our natural resources anymore, but hope-fully, public and Club members will gradually ebb away from the apathy which is conservation's primary threat.



Remember that proposed bike trail that would link the Cape Cod Rail Trail at Eastham and the Province Lands bike trail in Provincetown...the one many of you wrote Herbert Olsen, Cape Cod National Seashore Superintendent, about earlier? Well, since then, the most controversial issue to come along in ages is just that, what with the variety of viewpoints voiced by bikers, Cape Cod, Seashore National Park and residents!

Safety: being able to ride along freely without the whiz of constant traffic to and from Provincetown is a strong issue in favor of the proposed bike trail say the cyclists. On the other hand, argue Truro residents, connecting Provincetown to Wellfleet means added publicity which would draw more cyclists...etc.

So, at present the Cape Cod National Seashore Advisory Commission, now back in business after a 16-month pause, is studying the situation and is expected to voice a recommendation sometime in September!

In the meantime, thanks to all of you who wrote to state "reps" in favor of the capital outlay bill. I can share the good news that the bill was passed by the House before the legislature adjourned for the summer! And now that that goal was achieved, we need next to. write our Senators NOW urging their support in mid-September when state legislature adjourns once again! If our Senators get a lot of letters for open space, chances are very good that the bill will become a priority for action! S.O.S...1860 the environmental bond bill! It is one of extreme value to all of us as it represents monies to be had for restorations. acquisitions, recreation funds and more ... from Callahan Park in Framingham to renovation of Nickerson Park ... back to Nantasket.. over to Boston Harbor Island Parks..and more!



Five billion of us now share the Earth. How many of those, do you suppose, believe and practice "a commitment to conservation" belong to nature by helping preserve it? Well, as AMC members we're supposed to! That's what AMC stands for, according to Club brochures, but compared to those so active in Club activities as well as those non-active members, the percentage is very very small!

After all, more people means more development and more pollution what with human waste leaching into waterways rainfall human waste leaching into waterways rainfall carrying more fertilizer, road salt and dog droppings into storm drains that so very often empty into tidal inlets. Equally bad is the dis-appearing land all around us. This is what 'wonders' me. Here we AMC'ers go treking off in search of the wilderness and right behind us tiptoes civilization moving in closer and closer. Just take a peek at the White Mountains. Look at how congested it's become from the Conways north towards Pinkham Notch, or go over to the Franconia side and see all the new condo's and manmade attractions such as ferris condo's and manmade attractions such as ferris wheel and water slide sneaking onward towards the wilderness we try and flee off into.

The problems here are longstanding but there are a few things each of us can do to help besides supporting and strenghtening Club conservation efforts. On a local level, we should individually take more interest within our own towns about such things as the septic systems. Are they outdated or inadequate? Letters to newspapers and selectmen letting, them know your feelings about stemming the use of such if they are.

Since protection of our wetlands is a main concern, you should become familiar with the bylaws protecting them and support them again by letters to "powers to be." You can also help by participating or initiating beach clean-ups, being more careful about the lawn fertilizer you use or your neighbor uses, etc. Clubwide, read the conservation articles in the monthly club bulletin faithfully. If there are monthly club bulletin faithfully. If there are letters to write, calls for volunteerism, get in-volved or at the least interested so that you have up to date info to pass along to others.

Anyway, the message here is simple. We each owe it to ourselves as well as to our environment to meet the challenges facing it.

Thanks to so many of you who wrote our state representatives "voicing" our concerns about land conservation being so threatened with endless development and urging them to strongly support the Governor's Bill, the open space capital outlay bill, which is now in the Senate. While we await the outcome, we need to get busy and do some more letter writing, this time in regards to the proposed Bike Trail which, one day, could be a Boston to Cape Cod Bikeway.

According to SE AMC member William DeWilde, a resident of Truro, Cape Cod, who is monitoring the "progress" of said proposed Trail Extension which would run through Truro from its present termination at Seashore National Park, Eastham to Provin-cetown, Truro residents do not like any of the three alternatives the National Seashore has offered for the trail, namely using secondary roads. I would like to stress that Truro's position is that the bikers stay where they are...on the highways!

He continues, "I witness many, many people of all ages on bikes competing dangerously with fast moving aggressive automobile traf-fic every day. They, the bikers, need help!" Anyway, in 1988 let's all work together towards the pursuit of "healthy seafood", etc. Canoeists: with assisting in management of our rivers such as the <u>Taunton</u>. Hikers/walkers: with the trails committee <u>especially</u> because the network of trails we use often come into close proximity to little streams and the like which eventually wind their little selves down into the wetlands. And, more importantly, all of us: with periodical beach cleanups spring and autumn of every year. To close, for the nonactive member, letter writing efforts to our state "reps" to help with the fight against "plastic pollution" as well as, of course, our shrinking healthy environment by urging him/her to support state land bank bills.

# **Conservation Corner**

#### Pam Carter (398-2605)

Saturday, June 4 and Saturday, June 11 are both important dates not only for environmentalists but for all residents of Southeastern Mass.

June 4: SEM-AMC and Taunton River Study Committee co-sponsor a canoe trip on the Taunton River, to increase awareness of the recreational aspects of the river and to publicize the Taunton River Greenway Project. (See Dave Gunning's article on the project in April 1988 Breeze.) The river, the most important in S.E. Mass., drains 516 sq. mi. and its banks of vegetative wetlands, and lovely oak and pine forests, are native habitats for wildlife. The public needs to know how this river, chief waterway for the Indian tribes, has become polluted and how the pollution can be stopped. Help spread the word about the Greenway Project and come canoe!

June 11: Buzzards Bay Day. Just look at the map and see why this ocean bay is so vitally important. It now bears the title of Estuary of National Importance, which means it is so polluted that its clean-up rates extra finances. Unfortunately, we are all at least indirectly guilty of causing that pollution: road runoff, septic systems dumping into bay, beach litter, pet droppings, etc.

What can we do? Support and attend Buzzards Bay Day events planned to foster public awareness of the need to clean up our coastal waters. Local media will list shoreline tours, boat trips, exhibits, photo contest, conferences, and other activities. Because the Chapter entered this project late our participation this year consists of a hike along the Cape Cod Canal (see trip listings). Next year the conservation committee will work with other committees to expand AMC's participation in this important annual event. In the mean time, come hike!

The Governor of N.H. has signed the NH Rivers Bill (SB326). Thanks to all who wrote senators in support of this important bill.

North Country for Sale. At his last AMC Council meeting, retiring Exec. Dir. Tom Deans reported that due to present financial and taxation conditions, a vast amount of North Country acreage is or will be up for sale. This forest land has up to now been made available for hiking, canoeing and backpacking. Diamond International is selling about 800,000 acres in Maine and 67,000 in NH. AMC will work with other groups to put purchase packages together, but its activity can only be leadership and advocacy.
