

FROM THE CHAIR ...

1987 was a GREAT YEAR FOR SE MASS CHAPTER! We continued our slow but steady growth pattern.... at a time when cutbacks in direct mail programs were predicted to result in a drastic drop in membership.

We're definitely doing something right!...throughout the club, we have reputation as a friendly, outgoing and successful chapter.

In 1987, we had solid representation at the Club's Spring and Fall Town Meetings by several members of the Executive Board...and input into Club policies for the future.

The lack of leaders is always a problem in any volunteer organization, so this year we worked on several items to make leading easier and more fun... standardized trip reporting forms; reviewed the administering of trip fees for non-members; established guidelines to help leaders budget for weekend and longer trips; and set up a Leadership Recognition System to be announced at the Annual Meeting.

The Executive Board also approved an Education Committee proposal to establish a "scholarship" fund, to partially fund expenses for current/potential leaders to attend speciallized training programs and then pass their skills along back to the Chapter. You'll be hearing more about this in 1988!

Also, we've begun a formallized budget process and revision of our bookkeeping to a common standard to better coordinate with the Club. Our financial position is sound...what we need now is some creativity applied to the best way to use our funds.

One item considered was to acquire a piece of property for the Chapter. After much deliberation, it was felt that this was too major an undertaking in terms of manpower and logistics for us for the foreseeable future even if the property was donated.

In the last two years, we've strengthened our programs in three key areas: Conservation, Trails and Social activities, via such programs as the Spring Fling, Coastweek Celebration and several Trails events. Combined with our very strong canoe, biking and hiking programs, we've really got something going here. And it's all communicated beautifully via the most attractive newsletter in the Club, the Breeze!

We've also spent considerable time documenting our efforts, developing a "Facilities Research File", writing up some longrange plans, this Annual Report, etc., so we don't have reinvent the wheel every time.

The Club's Capital Campaign is drawing to a close... and SE Mass is doing its part, slowly, but surely! If you haven't pledged yet...do it now!

COMMUNICATIONS

Southeast Breeze and Appalachia Bulletin

This is a demanding and challenging job, with several components involved in getting the information to the members at the right time.

First, trip and other Chapter notices must be collected, put into format for Appalachia publication and submitted to Joy St. 2 months in advance for publication in the Bulletin.

Second, collect much the same info for the Breeze, one month ahead....plus up-to-date changes, special announcements, registration forms, etc. and articles of general interest. This has to be edited, typed, formatted and prepared for the printer.

Third is the Distribution. I'd like to thank Chuck Wright for taking on the job of seeing that it got folded, labeled & mailed on time each month.

We've tried to keep the Breeze as up-to-date and informative as possible, given the constraints of time and budget. I apologize for any typographical or editing errors that have affected a trip or slighted anyone.

I offer the following observations for the future....

- ...A two person editorial team would relieve pressure and allow checking of each other's ideas and work.
- ...Repeating full trip notices from Appalachia with advance notices as well has advantages, but leaves limited space and energy for more casual notes, articles, etc. What do the members want to see?
- ...Printing costs were held at \$130 for 4 pages in '87...'88 will likely see increases plus possible costs of typing and/or computer time.

Finally, I'd like to thank the activity chairs for getting their material to me on time each month and for their concern about making the job easier for me.

We drafted a job description for this new function with a kickoff task for each local PR person to choose an event to publicize...ours was the Coastweek Celebration, with news releases sent to 52 local papers as well as to the Mass. Coastweek organizers.

In 1988, the big clubwide event, the AMC's Hut Centennial Celebration will provide a focal point for some special media play. Hopefully, we'll be adding some local sparkle of our own for SE Mass!

BICYCLING

The season started in March, with our popular series of Bike Workshops, covering many aspects of bike repair and maintenance. An average of 26 people attended each session.

This year's ride roster of 24 scheduled rides, included 18 daytrips, 5 weekends, (Montreal, Nantucket, the Vineyard, Block Island and Camp Burgess), and a weeklong inn-to-inn trip in VT.

Attendance has been very good for most rides, with the overnight trips filled to capacity.

To wind up the season, the 6th Annual Century Bike Ride on Sept. 26 drew about 100 riders for one of the best fall weather riding days ever! Many thanks to all the riders and the crew that makes it happen!

A number of impromptu rides were held on Wed. evenings throughout the summer, with an average of 8-10 participants. The success of this program plus umerous requests will result in greater emphasis next year on shorter rides, better suited to novice and beginner riders.

Thanks to all who were instrumental in making this a most enjoyable biking season, and to my vice-chair, Roz Reilly, for her able assistance.

CONSERVATION

We've made some real progress this year....setting our focus on Wetlands Protection issues. Since Nov '86, several members have written letters to their State legislators on various bills, especially the environmental bond bill, covering \$418 million for land acquisition, restoration of parks and care of coastal beach areas.

Second, we've been involved in the development plans for the Cape Cod National Seashore project to put in a bicycle path linking the Rail Trail to the Provincetown trail to get cyclists off Rte 6. More help is needed as the debate heats up!

Work is underway with the Brewster Conservation Committee on designing a trail system for their newly-acquired land. And in Sept., we finally got the OK from Nickerson State Park to maintain some of our favorite trails there. As we head into 1988, we're going to be involved in a very exciting land management project in our own area...the establishment of a "Greenway" along the Taunton River. Watch the Breeze for news!

The SE Mass Chapter is on the move....I'm proud to have lead such a fine and vital organization over the last two years. They've been extremely rewarding to me personally, and I hope that more of you will step forward to enjoy the fun and challenge of a volunteer spot with the AMC..for a day's worktrip, for a few hour's worth of committee work per month, or even a seat on the Exec. Board. It's well worth the trip!
