

Our chapter was represented at the Earth Eve AHA event celebrated in New Bedford in April. We handed out AMC Conservation Action Network (CAN) postcards, AMC brochures, and some fun eco-friendly toys, which were a big hit with children of all ages (thanks, Louise Anthony!). This was a well-attended family event with other conservation-minded groups participating, including Mass Audubon, The Coalition for Buzzards Bay, and Clean Power Now.

At the AMC Spring Gathering hosted by the Delaware Valley chapter in Honesdale, PA, conservation chairs from all chapters had a chance to meet and be brought up to date by the AMC Joy St. staff on the latest conservation issues.

An informative talk and discussion was held about Wind Power, with research performed by the AMC presented on this important and controversial energy source. You can look forward to hearing more about this topic in the future...

Thanks to everyone who helped monitor haze pollution through the Visibility Volunteer program when you hit the trails this past year. The data collection cards and sheets were made available to hike Leaders and Co-leaders for use by members. Results of the study for 2004 are available at www.outdoors.org/mountainwatch.

A draft proposal was given out at the well-attended Mass. Forest Reserves meeting on Sept. 20 at Myles Standish State Forest. EOEA administrators spoke about the top priorities at Myles Standish, including prescribed burning to prevent future wildfires, management of native tree species, and harvesting to remove non-natives including Scott's Pine, Red Pine and Spruce. Practices that will promote biodiversity, maintaining high water quality, and replication of disturbance patterns will also be monitored and evaluated.
