Treasurer's Report

Many thanks go to Claire Goode, my predecessor, for all her hard work and the many hours spent going over figures and inputting data for the past two years' annual audits for Joy St. The audits have gone smoothly as she has been meticulous in her record keeping. This year we are transitioning from using Quicken to QuickBooks to align the accounting practices/procedures with Joy St. and the other chapters. We continue to operate in the black, not spending above our means and the committees and activity chairs continue to be cognizant of expenditures.

Printing and postage for our quarterly newsletter, *The Southeast Breeze*, continue to be our largest expenditures. To help decrease our costs, we are encouraging members to sign up for the electronic version of the *Breeze*. We have also begun accepting paid advertising in The Breeze. For some of our major events, such as Chapter Hut Weekend, we have been able to garner revenue.

Despite the bleak economy, the financial status of the Chapter continues to be sound and we look forward to another year of stability.



Membership Committee Report

The number of memberships has increased slightly over the past 12 months, from 2336 in Oct. 2008 to 2365 in Oct. 2009, a 1.2% gain compared to a club wide 1.7% loss. About one third of our membership is on Cape Cod (including about 50 on Martha's Vineyard and Nantucket), nearly 1000 are families, 74 are lifetime, and 7 are out of state. Overall, SEM has over 3300 members.

About 800 new members received a welcome letter and a copy of the *Breeze*. A new member workshop was held during the Spring Bash, and initial contacts were made with outdoor clubs at several local colleges to hopefully engage students in SEM activities.

I want to thank all our leaders who have encouraged individuals to join, taken new members under their wing, promoted events suitable to their abilities, and led events tailored to new members. Your efforts were instrumental in making SEM a vibrant and growing organization.

The Breeze

Communications Committee Report

This year the Communications Committee produced its usual four quarterly issues of the chapter's newsletter, *The Southeast Breeze*. However, 2009 saw the initiation of a second *Breeze* – a full-color electronic version with additional content. Now two versions of the *Breeze* are produced each quarter – the extended, color, electronic Breeze sent out via the new Kintera system (~200 subscribers) and the 12-page black and white paper *Breeze* sent out via snailmail (~3000 subscribers).

Also new for 2009 was the introduction of paid ads in the *Breeze* for activities that support the mission of the AMC. These ads provide additional revenue, but are mostly a service to AMC members. The electronic *Breeze* introduced ads where members can sell or swap gear.

The SEM Join-the-Club brochure was rewritten and updated, and is now available on the SEM website in either black and white or color and in three formats. Each of the various versions can be downloaded when needed, and printed or copied "on demand", thus saving wasted printing costs and guesswork.

A "Communications" area for the SEM website was created (click on "Communications" in the top banner). This provides a place to put *Breeze* and Outdoors deadlines, *Breeze* advertising policy, and Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ). Old Annual Reports and *Breezes* were rounded up and stored in an archival area on the website to preserve our history.

An ad hoc Website Committee was created by the SEM Executive Board to oversee the much needed updating of the SEM website during 2009. The Communications Chair was an ex officio member of this committee, as was the SEM Webmaster. In the October Executive Board meeting, the ad hoc Website Committee was dissolved, and the SEM website and SEM Website Committee were moved under the Communications Committee for its permanent home. Thank you to all SEM members who submit articles and pictures for the *Breeze*. A special thank you is extended to Ann McSweeney, as Assistant Editor of the Breeze, who edits and rewrites many of the articles submitted, and makes everyone look like a good writer! Another thank you to the new Website Committee for getting the website updated – and to Susanne Piche (Assistant Webmaster) for implementing all their changes.



Canoe / Kayak Committee Report

This year the Canoe/Kayak group held our planning meetings on Dec. 7, 2008 and March 1, 2009. We scheduled 62 trips for the months April through October 2009. All of our trips were scheduled to run on Wednesdays and Saturdays, starting at 10:30 AM for the 7 month period. The trips varied in length from about 5 miles to 14 miles.

During the 2009 paddling season we had a total of 18 different leaders. The 62 trips this year included 20 that were off Cape. The size of the paddling groups on the trips varied from 3 or 4 on some of the early trips to 12 to 15 on the summer trips. About 5% of the trips had to be canceled due to weather.

Conservation Committee Report

In response to Joy Street's desire to spread the word about climate change, SEM Conservation sponsored presenter training for the Climate Change Challenge developed by AMC staff. This was attended by members from several different AMC chapters, including SEM. On-line training sessions (in webinars) were held and attended by additional SEM members.

Two outings and the first climate change presentation were provided by Conservation during the SEM Spring Bash. Bill Ruel led an Earth Day clean-up at the Cape Cod Canal. This is an annual activity run by the AmeriCorps and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, which Bill has been helping with for years. Todd Kelly added an interpretive edge to his walk at Wakeby Mashpee Ponds.

This spring, the first Critical Treasures Event was held at Myles Standish State Forest. This was co-sponsored by SEM AMC, the Friends of Myles Standish State Forest and the Mass. Department of Conservation and Recreation. A variety of activities ranging from a long hike to a forestry talk were enjoyed by over 60 participants. Without the help of many people from DCR, TNC, the Friends group, and SEM AMC this would have never taken place. Thank you all.

Two new conservation leaders set up trips this year. Joanne Jarzobski had a good turnout for her June whale watching trip out of Plymouth, MA. Claire Goode set up a nature walk at Red Brook; however this had to be canceled due to construction. The North Attleboro National Fish Hatchery tour was repeated again this year with a similar response as in previous years.

During the Summer Picnic, a nature walk was provided. The picnic was held at the Lloyd Center in Dartmouth again this year. This is a fantastic facility with great natural history exhibits set in a beautiful location.

I want to extend a special thank you to Joanne Jarzobski for becoming the Conservation Vice Chair this year and for her interest in becoming the Conservation Chair for 2010. Joanne was one of the instrumental people in the success of our Critical Treasures Event. The SEM Chapter had scheduled rides throughout Southeastern Massachusetts which includes the following areas:

Recurring Rides:

- Monday Rides late day/early evening in the South Coast area

Scheduled Rides:

Cross Country Skiing Committee Report

The traditional long weekend at Applebrook B&B in Jefferson, NH, was held as an Inter Chapter trip with the 40+ Boston Chapter. Barbara Hathaway and Wayne Cardoza led 20 avid skiers on groomed trails at Bretton Woods on Saturday and Sunday, and Ken Jones led most of the same group on a short snowshoe activity on Monday. We enjoyed lots of snow, great trail conditions and a very compatible group of people who had such a great time that most of them are coming back again next year.

Art Paradice, Marc Bober and Bob Bentley led five enthusiastic skiers on a 2 ½ day back country ski adventure on the Catamount Trail in West Dover, VT, during the same weekend.

Barbara and Farley and two participants enjoyed the ambience of the Franconia Inn in New Hampshire, Feb. 10-12. The Inn's trail conditions were marginal on the day of arrival and the group opted to ski at Bretton Woods the following day. Would you believe the temperature was 51°!

A trip to Windblown in New Ipswich, NH, on January 24 was canceled because of a devastating ice storm that necessitated closing the trails for most of the season. Icy conditions also caused Bob Bentley to cancel his back country skiing at Myles Standish State Forest in Plymouth on January 31.

Hiking Committee Report

The 2009 hiking season has seen a great success, from our newly developed Parent, Grandparent and Child hiking series, to the perennial Summer, Fall, and Winter hiking series. The Hiking Committee has broadened its horizons through 4 weekly hiking programs that included weekdays, weeknights and weekends. All in all, the committee has sponsored 115 hikes and saw over 1246 participants at these hikes. This is a significant increase in activity over previous years. Our committee has travelled to New Hampshire (15 hikes), Maine (4 hikes) and Rhode Island (2 hikes), in addition to our own territory of Massachusetts. Leading these hikes, in these locations, were 21 different Hiking Leaders with the assistance of 19 different Co-Leaders.

On average, we saw 14 participants per hike with participant levels ranging from 2 through 23. Their ages ranged from 1 year to members in their 80's. The most popular destinations were within the local area at both Borderland State Park in Easton and The Blue Hills Reservation in Milton.

Our 2009 hikes were broken into 4 categories: Class 1- Local Hikes; Class 2 – Day hikes with significant elevation gain; Class 3 – 3-season overnight backpacks; Class 4 – Winter hikes. From January 2009 through September 2009, our leaders led 95 Class 1 hikes, 8 Class 2 hikes, 5 Class 3 hikes and 7 Class 4 hikes. Of these hikes, all of the Class 2, 3 and 4 hikes occurred in either New Hampshire or Maine. Our Class 1 hikes were primarily conducted in Massachusetts with a couple occurring in Rhode Island and a couple occurring in New Hampshire.

The breakdown of hikes per month is summarized in the following table::

Recently we have revised our leader categories. In our old system of classification, all winter hike leaders were Class 4. We have now separated Class 4 leaders into Class 4 leaders and Class 5 leaders. The Class 4 Leader category is now solely for winter day hike leaders. The Class 5 category is for winter backpack leaders. (All prior Class 4 leaders have been grandfathered into the new Class 5 classification.)

Overall, the 2009 hiking year has been extremely productive and seems to be expanding. We currently have 26 participants signed up for the Winter Hiking Series Workshop in Sandwich. Both our 2009-2010 Winter Hike Series and Winter Snowshoe Series have been planned and listed on the online trip system. With any luck, we will see the numbers of both leaders and participants grow even larger in the next twelve months—at least that is the goal of the Hiking Committee!

My thanks go out to our extremely active leaders and co-leaders and also to Christine Pellegrini, my Vice-Chair of Hiking who has assisted in many visible and invisible ways.
